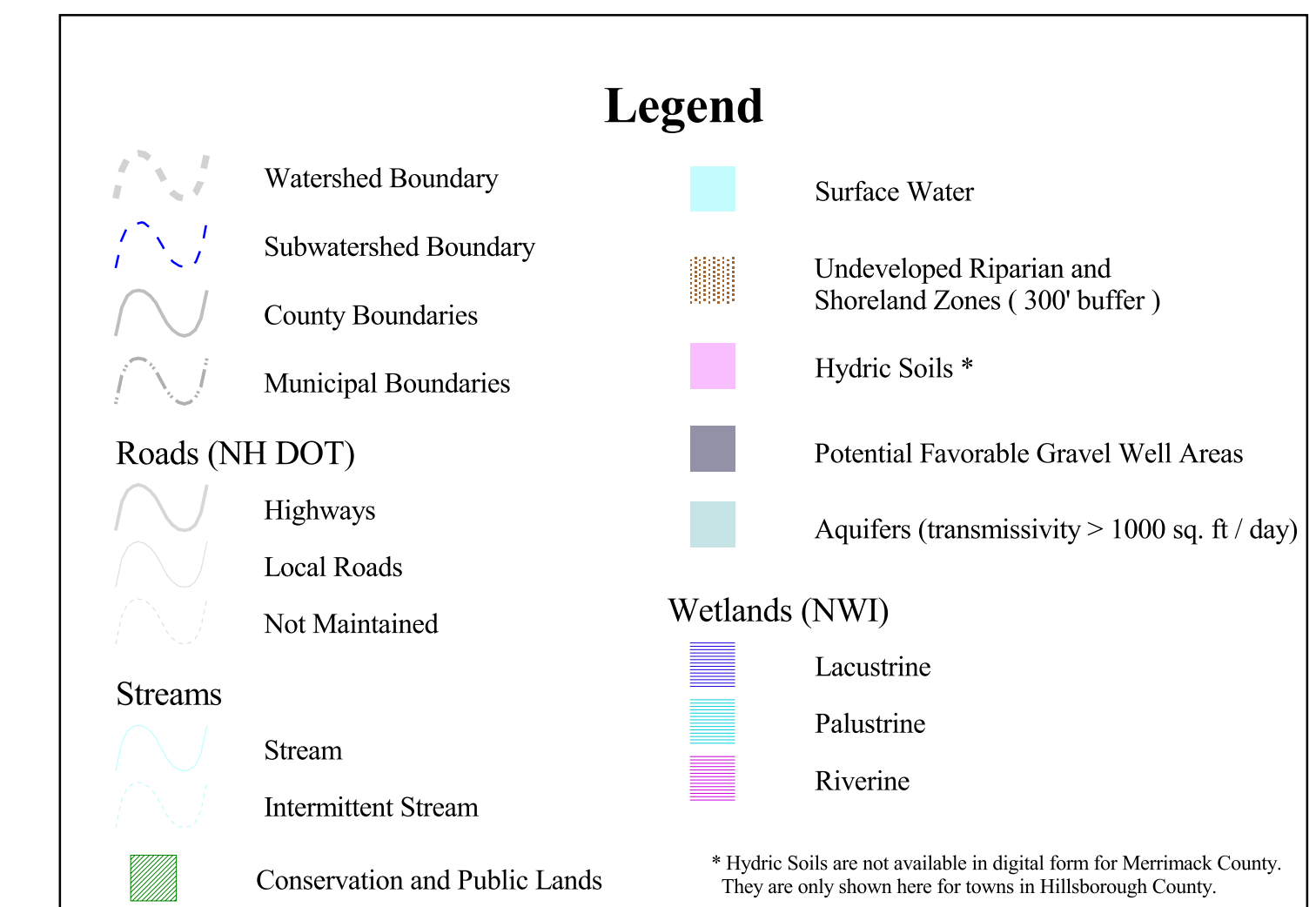
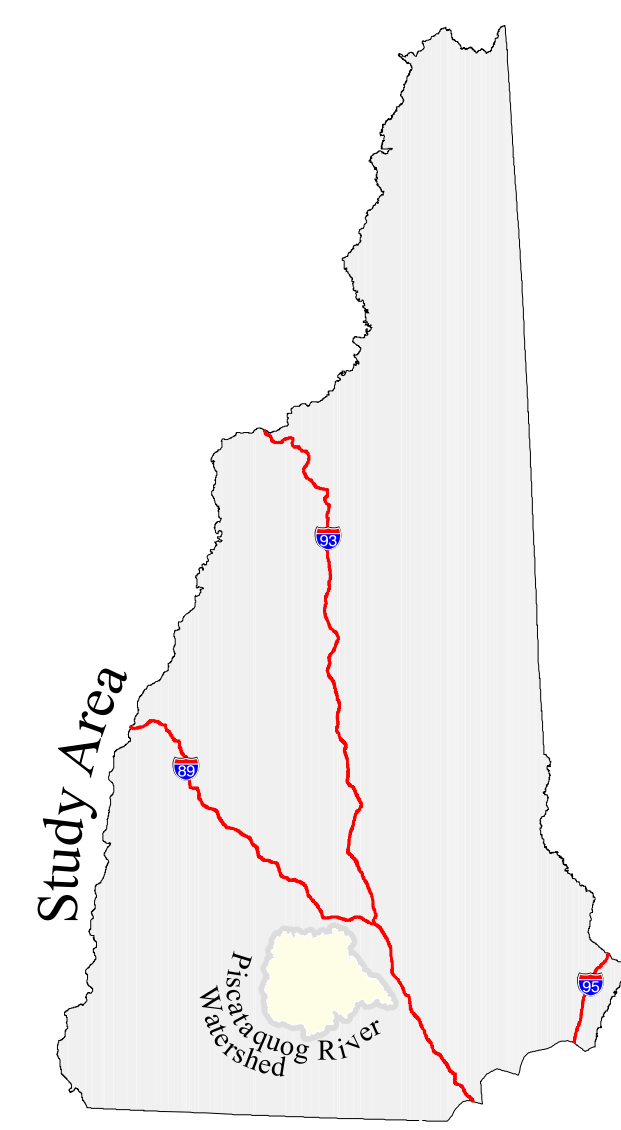


Conserving the Ecology of the Piscataquog River Watershed

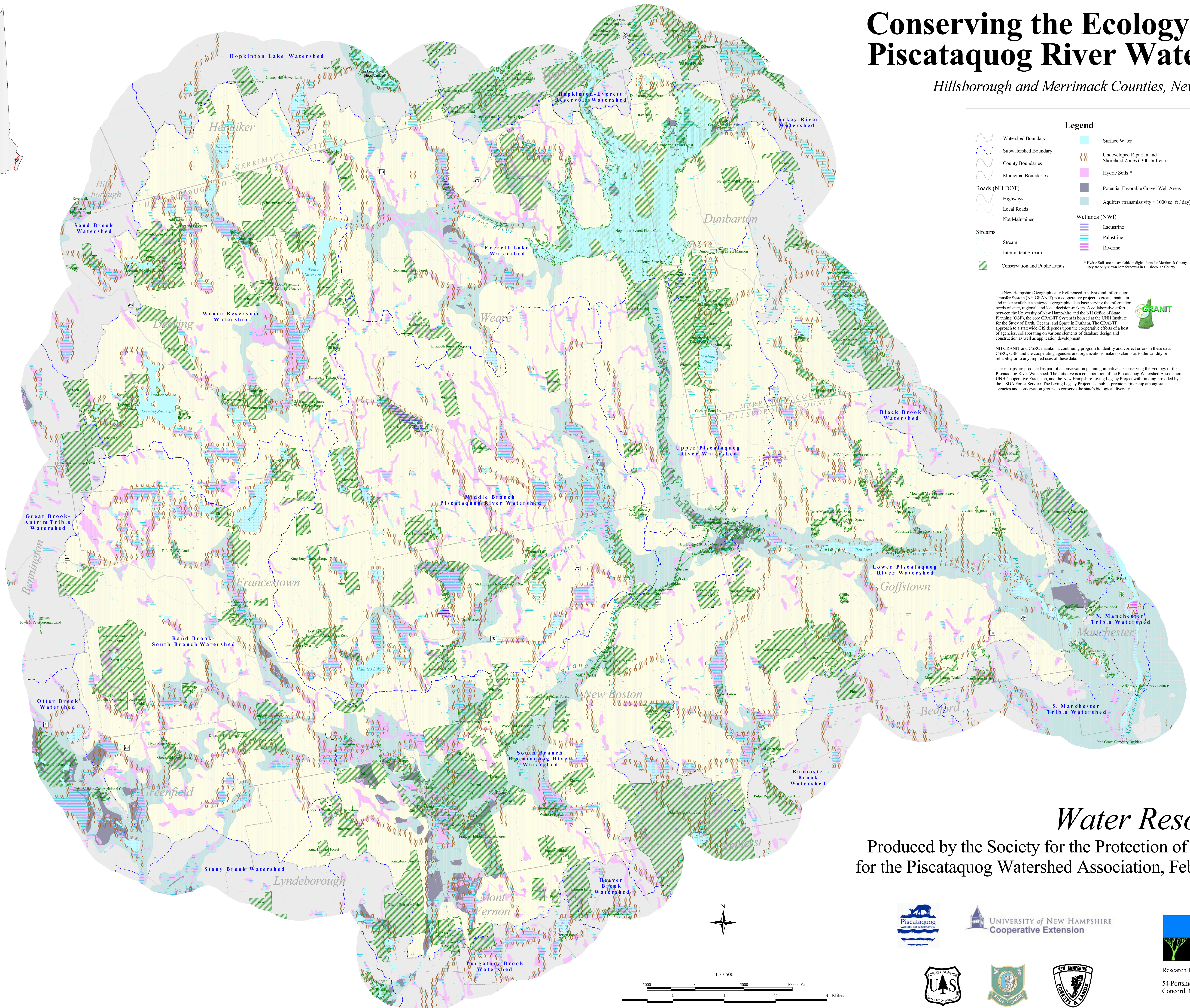
Hillsborough and Merrimack Counties, New Hampshire



The New Hampshire Geographically Referenced Analysis and Information Transfer System (NH GRANIT) is a cooperative project to create, maintain, and make available a statewide geographic data base serving the information needs of state, regional, and local decision-makers. A collaborative effort between the University of New Hampshire and the NH Office of State Planning (OSP), the core GRANIT System is housed at the UNH Institute for the Study of Earth, Ocean, and Space in Durham. The GRANIT approach to a statewide GIS depends upon the cooperative efforts of a host of agencies, collaborating on various elements of database design and construction as well as application development.

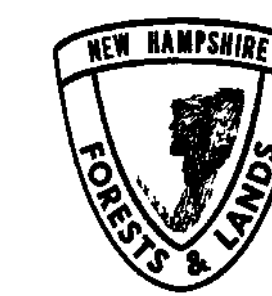

These maps are produced as part of a conservation planning initiative - Conserving the Ecology of the Piscataquog River Watershed. The initiative is a collaboration of the Piscataquog Watershed Association, UNH Cooperative Extension, and the New Hampshire Living Legacy Project with funding provided by the USDA Forest Service. The Living Legacy Project is a public-private partnership among state agencies and conservation groups to conserve the state's biological diversity.
